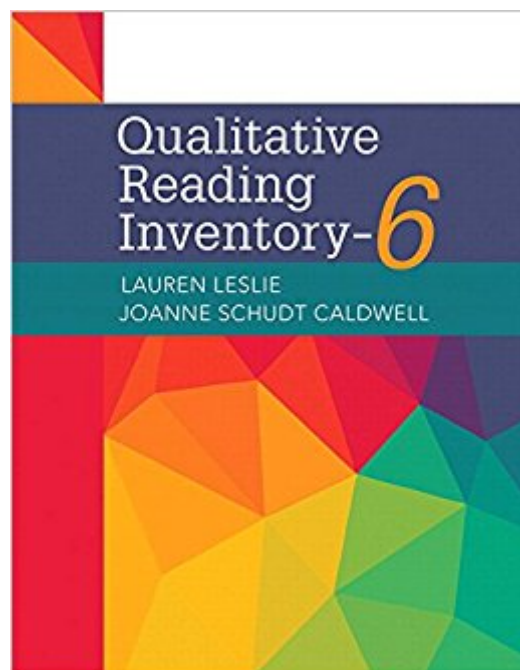

There is a QRI-5 now. If you lack a comprehensive, qualitative reading assessment such as the F&P assessments then you need to get this. It's cost effective and yields exactly the kind of information you need.

QRI4 was first introduced to me as I was getting my reading endorsement. My school is VERY into DIBLZ and does not offer the upper grades a DRA kit (not too unhappy about that given the length of each assessment) so I had to come up with a better assessment for my reading class. This tool is one of a few good resources for me (concepts of print is very good as well: *Concepts About Print: What Have Children Learned About the Way We Print Language?*) and offers me a good idea of what I need to teach and what the students are doing well. It is handy for folks who don't yet know a lot about reading assessments as well as those of us who are total geeks. It's quick, it's easy, it's accurate, and it is USEFUL best of all. Now go.
